



PE & SPORT PREMIUM REPORT 2017-2018

BACKGROUND

The PE and sport premium is designed to help primary schools improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils. The Government is spending over £450 million on this funding since 2013.

Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in years 1 to 6. Schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £8,000 and an additional payment of £5 per pupil.

Schools must spend the funding to improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils, but they are free to choose the best of way using of the money.

RIDGEWAY ACADEMY

Ridgeway received £18220 during the academic year 2017-2018 for its PE & Sports Grant. The funding has been spent in a variety of ways:

- Investigating the potential to increase internal sports teaching and learning space for the school.
- Purchase of more equipment to widen the number of sports available to our children as part of the curriculum; Trampolines
- Continued support to the School Sport Partnership in Redditch through the release on a staff member for one afternoon per week.
- Competition entry – various teams and individuals will continue to be entered into competitions for golf, football, cricket and the entrance of a Rugby team at County level.

THE IMPACT OF THE PE & SPORTS PREMIUM AT RIDGEWAY

- Increased extra-curricular provision for various sports across the school year.
- Increased participation in Rugby with affiliated coaches.
- Training of members of staff in primary touch rugby.
- Increased number representing the school in county athletics - investment in modern athletics equipment plays a part in this
- Pupil progress in PE is consistently above national averages (measured through teacher assessment)
- Number of pupils taking GCSE in year 9 was significantly higher than other subjects due to the pupil's interest in PE being nurtured when they were in Year 5/6.
- Pupils from a variety of first schools were able to attend a PE days at Ridgeway Academy. In excess of over 500 pupils attended.

Our school teams are proving highly successful across numerous sporting disciplines:

- Year 6 boys football team reached the final of the Redditch cup.
- The year 6 tag rugby team have been crowned district champions.
- Year 6 Girls Rounder's team reached the final of the district tournament.
- 60 members of Year 5/6 reached the Redditch athletics final
- 30 pupils with additional needs attended the Redditch indoor athletics final with varying success.
- We continue to signpost pupils with additional needs to access alternative provisions outside of school.

Success with our older year groups demonstrates the legacy of the PE funding and the impact it has had on our pupils since receiving it during their time in KS2, their achievements include:

- Year 8 girls football team became district football champions for the 5th year running
- Year 8 boys and girls both finished 1st in the indoor athletics district competition
- Year 8 boys cricket team were crowned county cricket indoor champions
- Cross Country Team district event results:
 - Year 7 Girls – 5rd
 - Year 7 Boys – 1st
 - Year 8 Girls – 2nd
 - Year 8 Boys – 4th
- Year 7 girls reached the final of the district Rounders event
- Year 7 girls came 2nd overall in the School Games Netball Competition
- Year 8 boys table tennis team have been crowned district champions.

ACADEMIC YEAR 2018-19

Ridgeway should receive around £9,000 for PE & Sports in the next academic year. The plans for these funds include:

- Installation of basketball posts in outdoor areas
- Continue to support the sports partnership through release of a teacher for 1 afternoon per week.
- Restructuring of the PE department and appointment of new staff.
- Move away from sports day to create a Ridgeway Athletics championship.
- Use professional football coaches to enhance the provision of football after school clubs; Adam Tait (Ex-BCFC player)
